

THE PANGS OF LETTING GO



Yes, it is sadly that the Sisters Holy Cross are saying goodbye and thank you for the many years of love, joy, and challenges. On July 31, 2017, we left Infant Jesus Parish in Nashua, New Hampshire where we served for 107 years (1910–2017).

The history of our stay is extraordinary! As we reminisce, we recall stepping into the 1910 building to greet 235 students. Two sisters of Holy Cross resided at the convent at St. Louis-de-Gonzague and walked back and forth to Holy Infant Jesus for four years. On occasion (most likely in the winter) they traveled by horse and buggy.

In 1914 a convent wing was added to the chapel only to be destroyed by the 1930 fire that took 125 homes and buildings, among them the church and school. A woman generously offered her home to the five sisters and chose to move in with her sister. During these trying times the sisters continued their mission on scattered sites until the new convent was built in 1931. Again in 1955, another fire destroyed the convent. Four years later the present brick building was build and even provided an entrance directly into the school. Providently, the trials and blessings at Infant Jesus Parish brought the community together in prayer, friendship, and strength.

Though we mourn our departure from this strong and noble parish, we know that the parishioners understand our own aging and losses of personnel. We pray that Infant Jesus Parish (now known as Blessed John XXIII Parish) will be blessed and remain strong as it was in years past! The Sisters of Holy Cross will be ever grateful for your support, care and love. You remain in our hearts and prayers!

THE SOLAR ECLIPSE

To conclude this event, an ice cream social followed as the reactions around the spectacular event continued to be the focus of conversation. We all hope to be around for the next total eclipse that will be visible in our part of the country in 2024.

Two years after celebrating the fiftieth anniversary of the purchase of the Pittsfield, New Hampshire, property, the sisters in the U.S. Sector gathered Saturday, August 26th - five days after gathering for the solar eclipse. At the invitation of Berakah Staff, group а sixty approximately sisters and associates enjoyed one last cookout in Pittsfield followed by a time of prayer in the form of a PowerPoint presentation whose theme focused on: "We Remember You, We Honor You, We Thank You" as we "prayed our goodbyes."

Within the context of making the facility available to these groups, the sisters welcomed parishioners for daily mass during the winter months, hosted a wedding at the Shrine, provided a refuge for an entire family that needed to be relocated due to the loss of their home due to a fire, and provided shelter for a











foster child.

In 1993, the sabbatical program at "Berakah: A Place of Blessing" was launched. Women religious from around the world brought about a sense of universality to this small town. They came from North America, South America, Europe, Asia, Africa, and Australia.

It's obvious from the witness of those who spoke that the memories will never be eradicated.
